


<p>Description: It is difficult to see and access all of the posters that are clumped together in the similar posters view - when I hover over them, they do rise to the top of the pile, but it makes it difficult to look at two posters at once, and it makes it difficult to compare events. The user shouldn't have to hold all of the different events that they are interested in per category simultaneously.</p>	
<p>Principals to Consider: Do not overload user's working memory, Visibility, Fitt's Law</p>

<p>Description: Visual Ambiguity - Scrollbars on the side of a line, it makes it seem like the section of 2 days, in this example the 20th and the 21st, will both scroll - there should be clear separation between days, perhaps using a vertical line, so that this is not confusing. Pulling the scrollbars clarifies this via feedback.</p>	
<p>Principals to Consider: Natural Mapping, Visible Navigation, Use of past Conditioning</p>

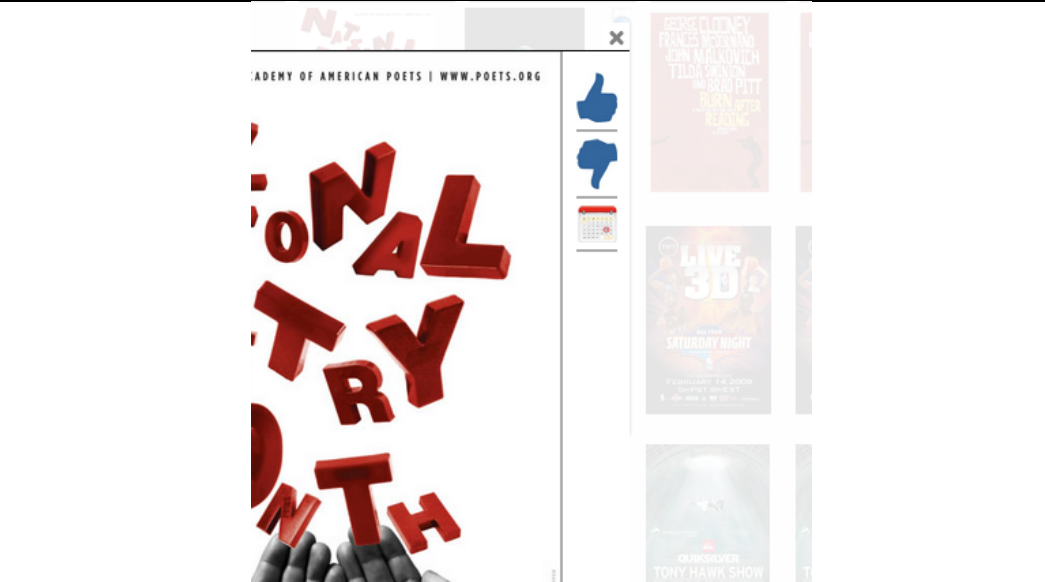
Description: The tags that apply to an event are not on the poster, nor is any other meta information beyond the poster itself, which means that the categories for similar events are not consistent throughout the interface.

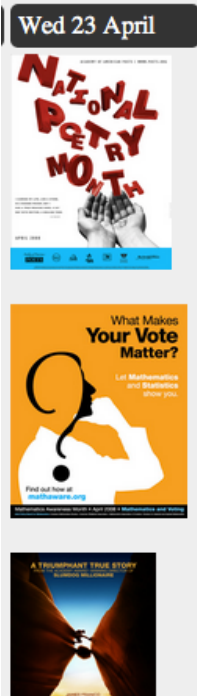
Description: It is unclear what liking and un-liking events does - there is nothing to indicate how many likes or dislikes a given event has, and nowhere to see it. Is this essential to the application?

Principals to Consider: Help and Documentation, Consistency, Visibility of Status

Severity: Major



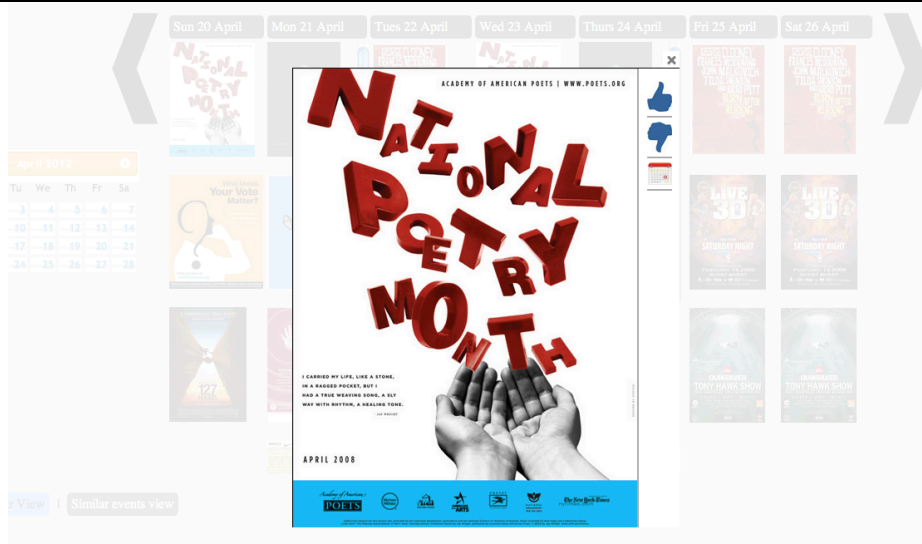
Description: There is no obvious ordering to the events, ie grouping or ordering, within a day in the weekly columns. Are they ordered vertically by time, for example?

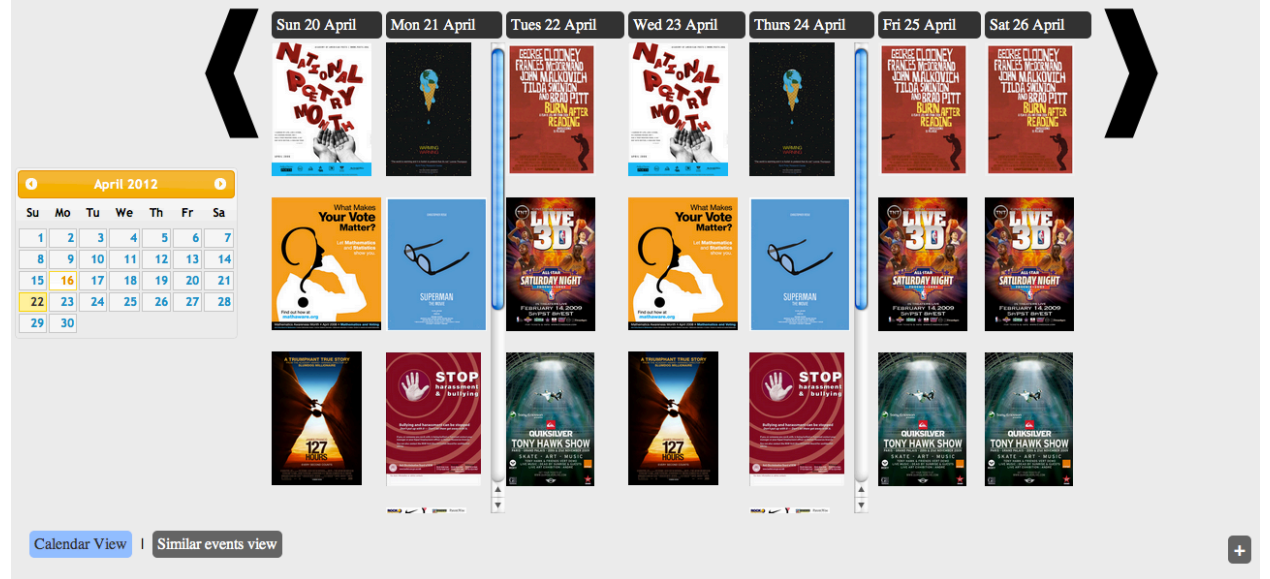
Description: There is no way to zoom into the picture in order to be able to read the text on the poster in case it is too small at this level of zoom.

Severity: Minor



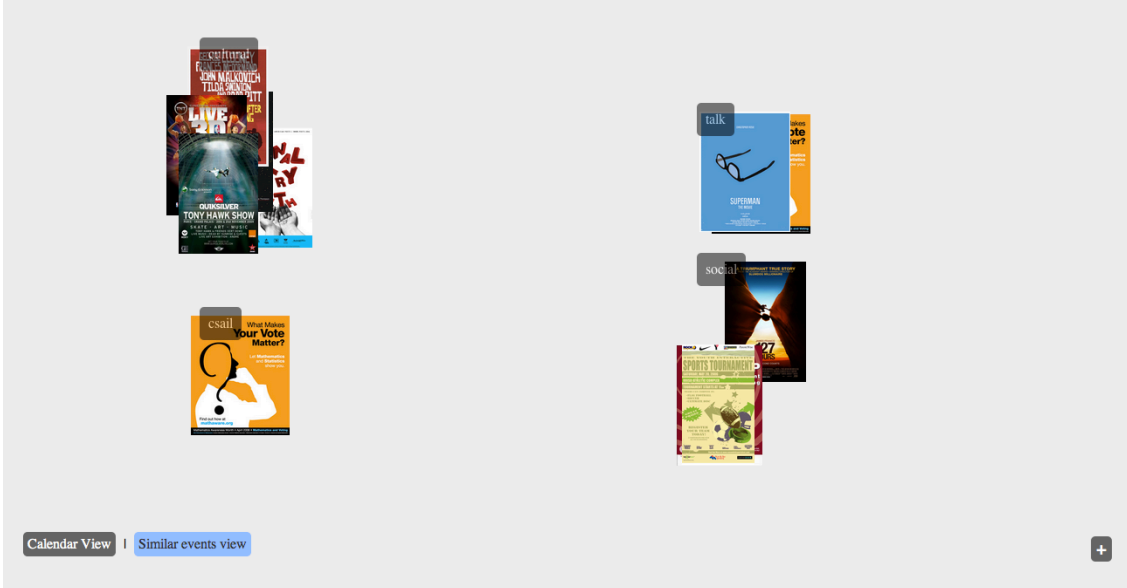
Description: It is unclear what benefit or use case the ability to scribble currently has, particularly since they cannot be saved.

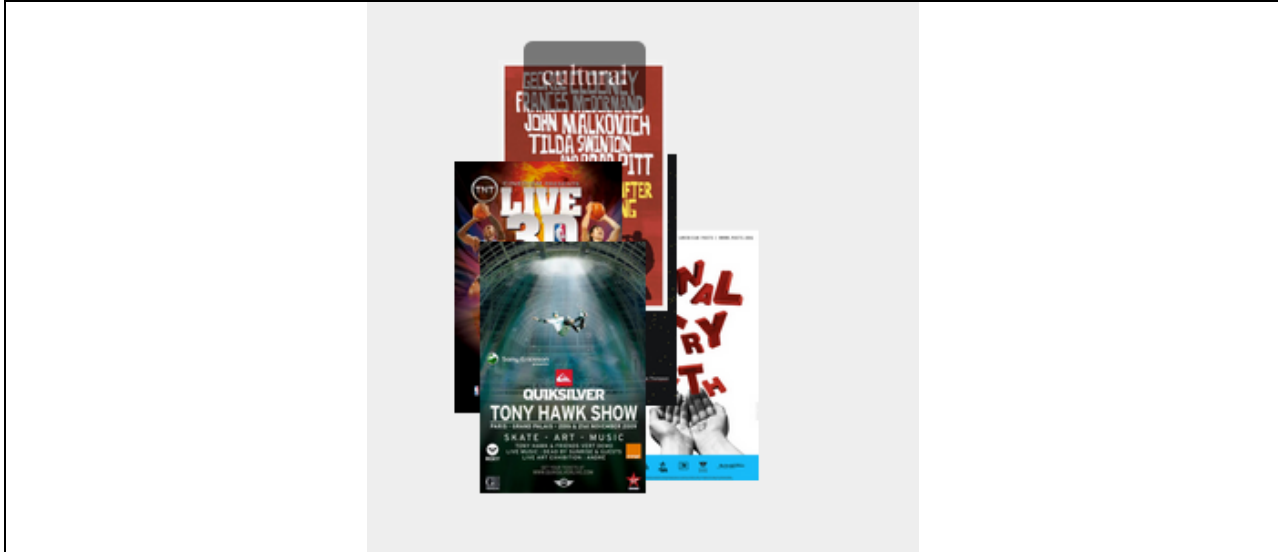
Description: There is no list of tags allowing the user to jump to a particular tag, or search for a tag, which could become problematic when there are many tags.

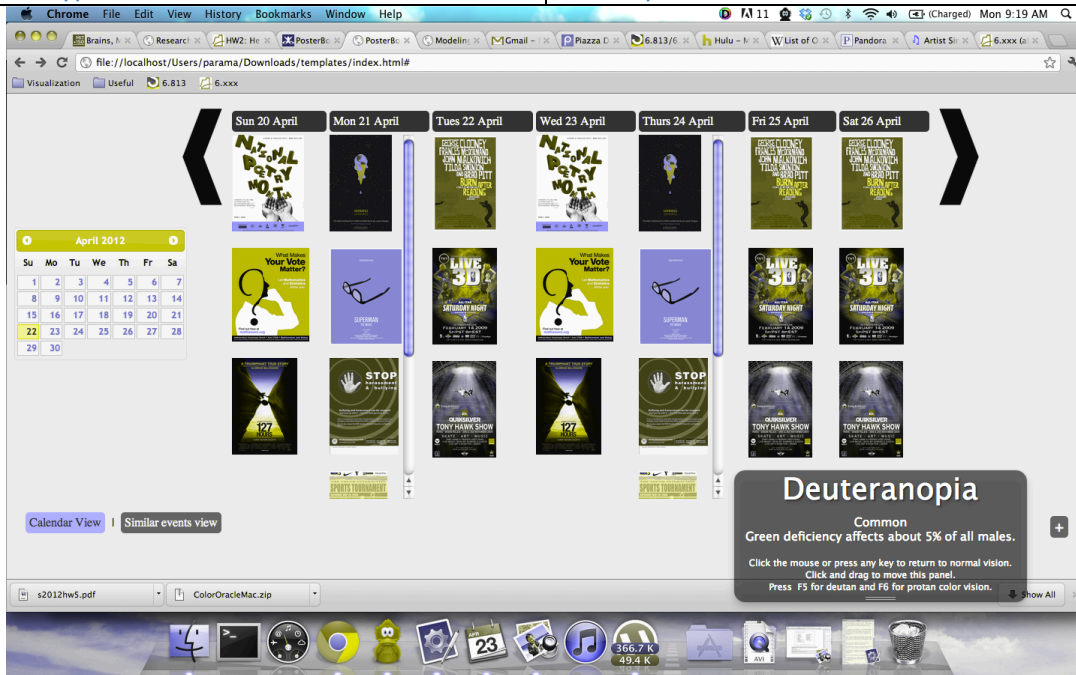
Description: Use of tagging in order to group events increases efficiency in terms of finding events of interest for the user

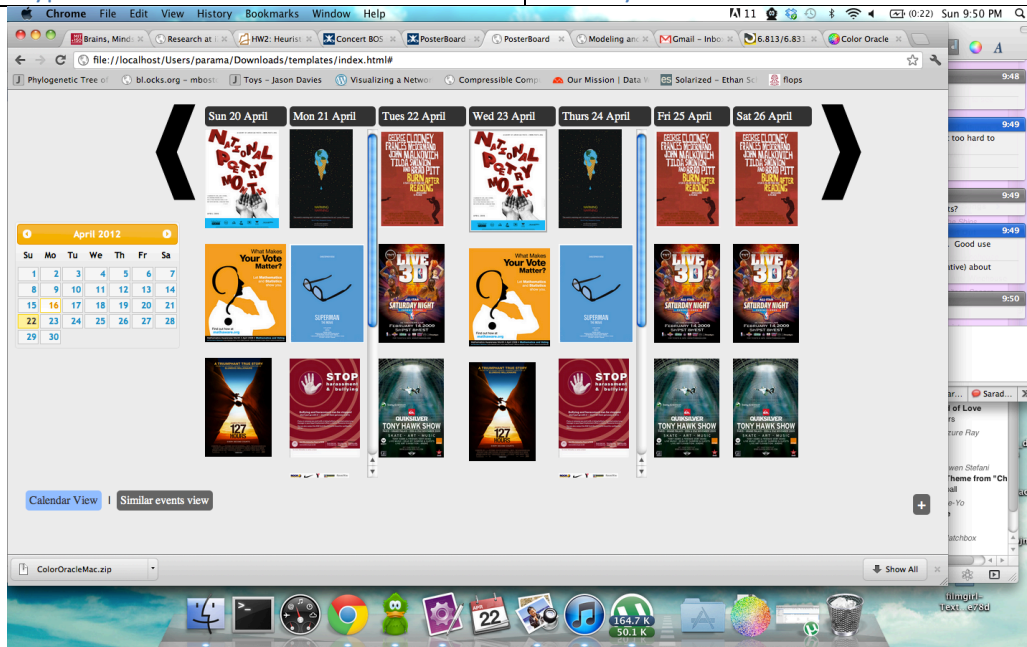
Description: Your interface color usage stands up to tests for colorblind users.




Severity: Good

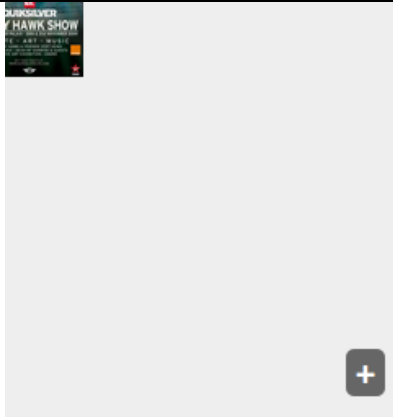

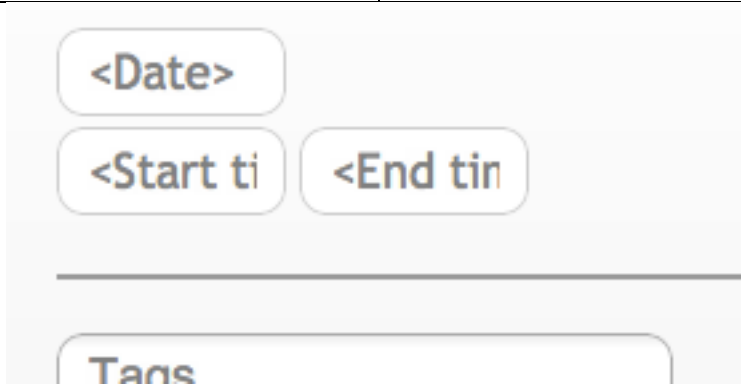
Description: It is unclear how to add a poster. The plus sign is very small and unlabeled.

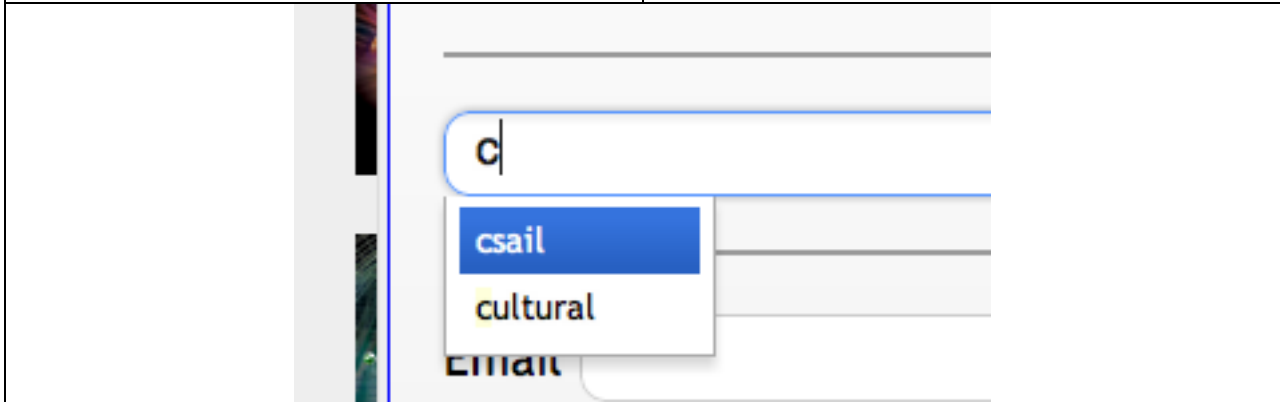
Description: Labels don't fully show on this screen. The only way to see the entire label is to highlight the text and scroll over.

Severity: Good



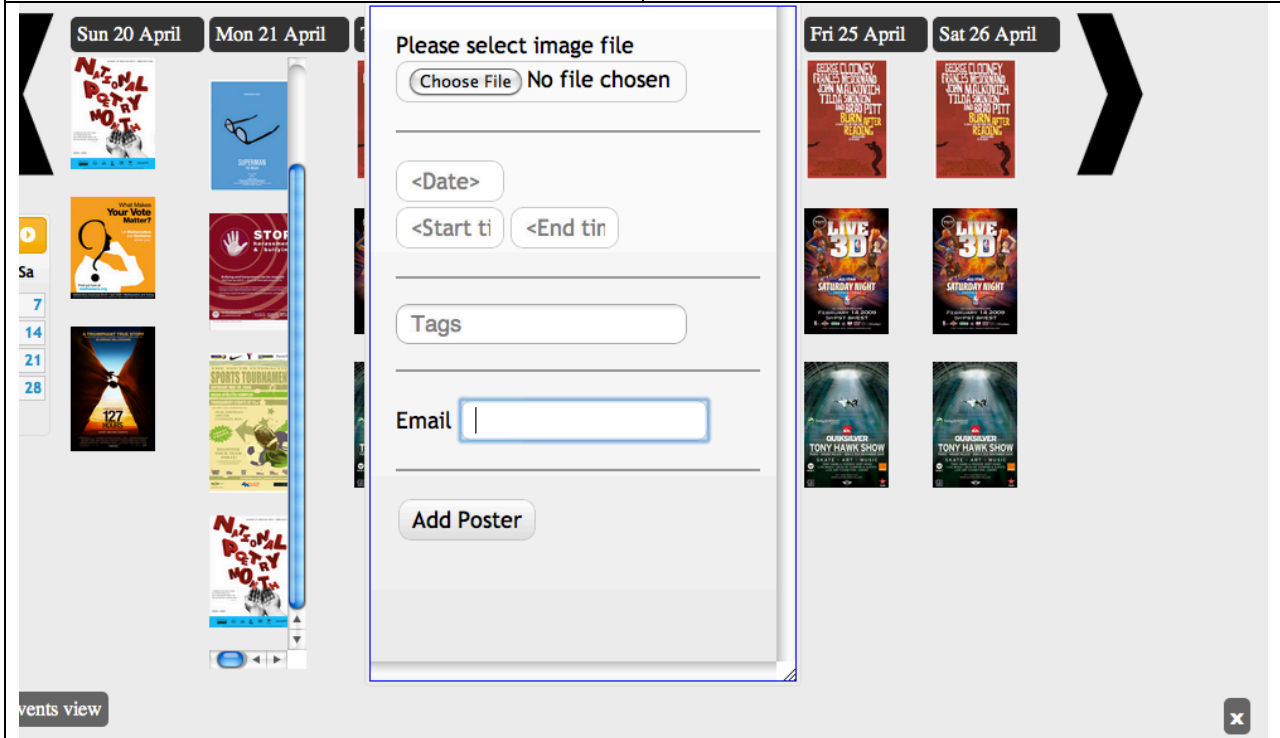
Description: The search for tags lists past tags as well as filtering tag options by character, which makes typing in tags much easier

Severity: Major



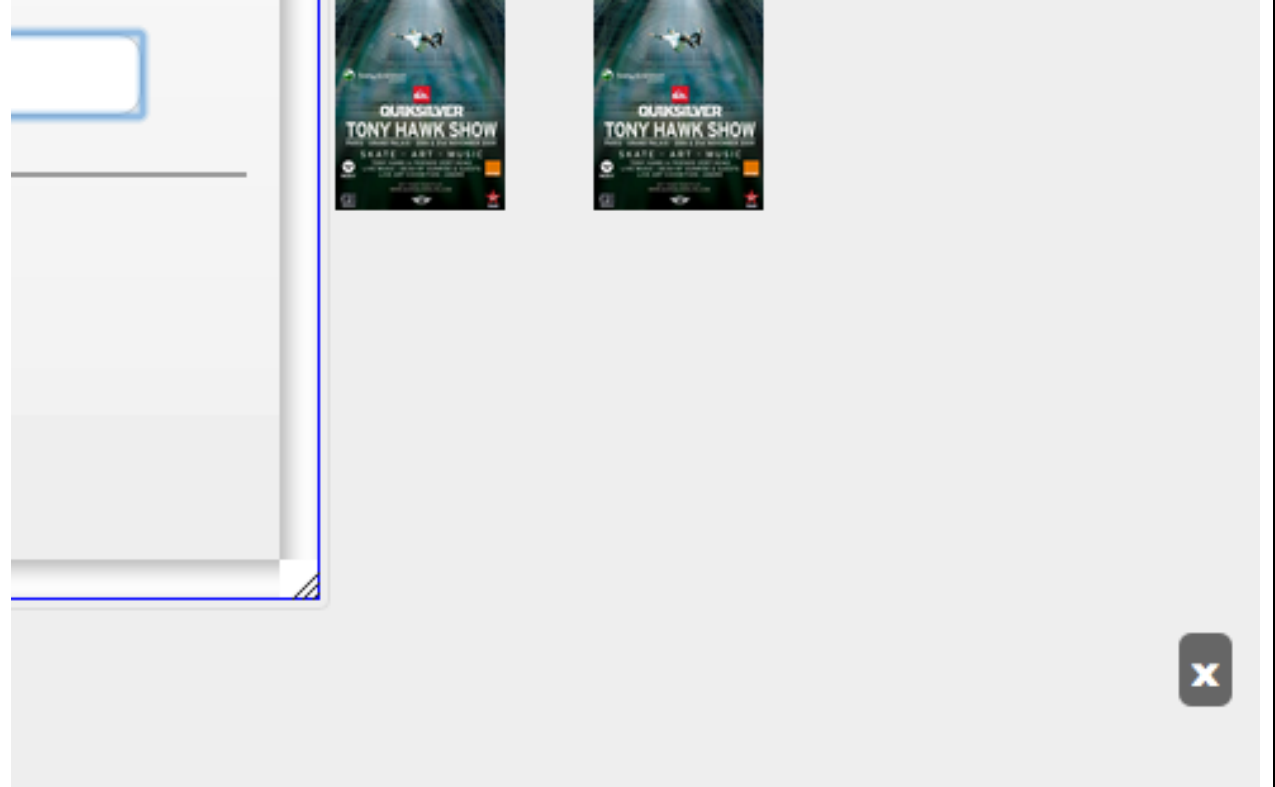
Description: There is no discernible way to edit a poster, or change information once you have uploaded the poster.
