

However, due to how repetitive the organization of content is, it is hard to differentiate between different features with a squint test.</p>

I recommend that some kind of "Save Progress" button is added to the current project display.)</p>

This provides for good internal consistency and is an efficient way of getting help while in the middle of working on a project.</p>

It would be good to provide an organized way of differentiating between the links and instruction content with headers, a change in color/font choice, or choosing a different location to place the links on the page.</p>

Although most users would immediately realize that they have to select a page from the categories on the left-hand menu, it would be good to provide some kind of section introduction/instructions to this page rather than leave it blank. Additionally</p>

I would recommend having the category names change color on mouse over and/or having the "+" icon change to a "-" icon when expanded to indicate that it can be collapsed after expansion.</p>

It is fairly clear to differentiate between text that is bold or not, but with the stars under the Difficulty header, it is almost impossible to differentiate between stars that are bolded or not (see circled in red in screenshot). I would add another way of displaying to the user that a filter has been selected, potentially by displayed all the selected filters above the search results. I would also change the way that difficulty is assessed (from stars to a different symbol), or select a different font with different glyphs.</p>

However, new users may be unaware that multiple filters under one category can be selected for further inclusion in their search. Perhaps changing the filter selection to check boxes or something more visually indicative would help new users.</p>

Because most users read and scan content in the "Z" order (top-left, top-right, bottom-left, bottom-right), it was not the location I initially expected to see this kind of feedback and suggest moving it to the top-left corner for external consistency, making it easier for new users to gain feedback.</p>
	<p>Internal Consistency, Learnability</p>	<p>Minor</p>	<p>Although all of the headers for each page took on the same format and styling, the "Lounge" page was the only one with informational content below its title. I suggest expanding this to every page for internal consistency as well as added help/guidance for new users who may not know what a page is for.</p>

I would change the color of the font, use icons, or find another simplistic way of displaying this information.</p>

Right now, hovering over online usernames causes the mouse to change to an icon that gives the impression that the usernames are links, but nothing occurs when they are clicked. Additionally, this display is externally consistent with many chat room displays which makes it appear as if users can chat with other users individually, outside of the Lounge (I am not sure if this is going to be implemented or not). It would also be useful to provide a way for users to manage their friends list efficiently from this interface, so providing icons for settings/adding friends/etc. would be helpful in the next stage of implementation.</p>

However, if the website were to become highly populated, there could easily be a big problem with finding chat rooms efficiently. Because all of the lounges are displayed the same way, it would be hard to browse through a large listing of them and figure out which ones are relevant or not, or to check back in on a lounge where a user left off. Better categorization/labeling of lounges is needed here to give the user a more efficient experience in browsing new lounges or returning to old ones.</p>

Although this is a useful functionality, the size of this button in contrast to all of the buttons of the website does not support internal consistency. Additionally, the button's size and the attention it attracts from the user is disproportionate to its functionality, which is quite minor in comparison to other features.</p>

Although it is efficient to have the template pop up in a new window (which it already does), this addition would give more experienced users an even more efficient means of starting new projects.</p>
<p align="center"><b>Project Instructions</b></p> <p>"Step 1: Print and cut out pattern template. Transfer pattern by tracing the template lightly on the appropriately colored felt and then cutting.</p> <p>Step 2: With the pink thread, sew the cake side to the cake bottom as shown, using blanket stitch. Make sure that the right sides are facing OUTWARDS when you are sewing them together!</p> <p>Step 3: With the white thread, sew the two cream spirals to the cake fronts with a running stitch as shown. Make sure the swirls are mirrored!</p> <p>Step 4: With the pink thread, stitch the cake fronts on using blanket stitch, leaving a small opening for stuffing the roll.</p> <p>Step 5: Stuff the roll, then sew the opening closed with blanket stitch."</p>	<p align="center">Help &amp; Documentation</p>	<p align="center">Major</p>	<p>Because the problem statement for this website seems to address many users who are not experienced with sewing and does not assume a fixed age group, the wording and level of detail of the project instructions should enable even the most young &amp; inexperienced users to fully understand how to complete a project. In Step 1, an inexperienced user might not know what kind of pen/pencil to use for tracing the template on the felt. In Steps 2 &amp; 3, a young user may not know which side of the cakes is the "outward" side or may need further explanation for how to "mirror" the swirls. In Step 4, "small opening" could be ambiguous: how small, and what about in situations where someone is making a smaller or larger version of this project in terms of dimensions? More details would be good here, and perhaps videos instead of pictures would be more useful.</p>

<p><b>Project Instructions</b></p>	<p>Safety, Learnability, User Controls &amp; Freedom</p>	<p>Major</p>	<p>Although there are very nice graphics and photos that accompany the instructions, there is currently no functionality in place for users to get help on specific projects' instructions or their sub-steps. Linking projects to Lounges or providing a function for users who make mistakes on their projects or would like to share advice on how to recover from mistakes would be extremely useful for users who are attempting difficult projects.</p>
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
